EDUCATION

Working with members of our community, we facilitate growth by organizing workshops, championing the arts, and establishing partnerships with Arab and non-Arab organizations alike to build a stronger community. BOYS & GIRLS CLUB



The Arab American Heritage Council hosted an educational workshop for The Boys & Girls Club of Greater Flint. Led by our executive director, Devin Bathish, the workshop outlined the basic aspects of Arab culture, including language, fashion, and dance. The children especially enjoyed modeling traditional Palestinian clothing. However, the highlight of the night was getting the opportunity to learn and perform the dabka, a traditional Arab line dance.

UNITY IN DIVERSITY

The AAHC was honored to be a part of the annual Unity in Diversity event. This event seeks to build bridges of communication, support, & understanding among the diverse cultures, nationalities, races, genders. and religions that make up our community. Executive Director, Devin Bathish, taught the audience about the history of the Dabke and then had everyone participate in the Dabke together.



FILM FESTIVAL

The AAHC partnered with the Flint Institute of Arts and Arab American National Museum to host their annual Arab Film Festival. A mixed audience of Arab Americans, FIA members, and Flint residents enjoyed learning and engaging in conversation about issues facing the Arab world after watching three short films. The feature film, Hany Abu-Assad's "The Idol," detailed the true story of Mohammad Assaf and the immense obstacles he faced in his rise to become the first Palestinian winner of the Arab Idol singing competition.





AANM FILM FESTIVAL

At this event, the Arab American National Museum showcased several films, and offered special programs such as a screenwriters workshop, panel discussions, reception and an Iftar dinner. Executive Director, Devin Bathish, moderated the film "Wajib" and led a discussion following the movie.

SOUTHWESTERN EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOP

NNAAC Fellow, Lucine Jarrah, was invited to speak at Southwestern High School in Flint to highlight the Arab experience in the United States for students, as well as discuss the importance of creating spaces to share these experiences. The students greatly enjoyed learning from Lucine and many asked for another workshop with her in the future.

AWARD WINNERS

COMMUNITY CONTRIBUTOR OF THE YEAR AWARD: Mr. Handy Lindsey, Jr. and the Ruth Mott Foundation



Mr. Handy Lindsey, Jr. is the retired President of the Ruth Mott Foundation, which he has led since September 2014. Under his leadership, the Ruth Mott Foundation enacted a daring new strategic plan to empower and uplift the community of Flint's North side. Handy has over 30 years of leadership experience in professional philanthropy and has served on the board of directors of more than 24 civic organizations, policy institutes, and professional associations of philanthropy.

PHYSICIAN OF THE YEAR AWARD: Dr. Khalil Katato



Dr. Khalil Katato is a Hematological Oncologist based in Flint and affiliated with many local hospitals, including Hurley Medical Center where he currently serves as the Vice Chair of Internal Medicine. Dr. Katato has held numerous professional appointments throughout his distinguished career in Amman, Jordan, Doha, Qatar, and Flint, MI. Dr. Katato is a member of both the American Society of Hematology, the American Society of Clinical Oncology and is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. Additionally, Dr. Katato has spent much time and energy teaching the next generation of physicians as a Clinical Associate Professor of Medicine at the Michigan State University CHM and is an active member in teaching Internal Medicine at Hurley Medical Center and Genesys Regional Medical Center.

ARAB AMERICAN OF THE YEAR AWARD: Dr. Hiba Wehbe-Alamah



Dr. Hiba Wehbe-Alamah earned her PhD and post-master's certificate in Transcultural Nursing and holds advanced certification in transcultural nursing. In 2011, she was inducted as one of 37 Transcultural Nursing Scholars worldwide by the Transcultural Nursing Society. She is a member of the National American Arab Nursing Association. She co-developed the first prototype for a computer based cultural simulation game (CultureCopia©). She is nationally and internationally recognized for her scholarly and service contributions to the field of transcultural nursing.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH



ARAB AMERICAN LEADERSHIP DAYS


The Arab American Heritage Council, along with Arab American community organizations from across the nation participated in the annual Arab American Leadership Days in Washington D.C. AAHC leaders had the opportunity to learn about the latest updates from policy experts. They were then able to advocate on the issues of healthcare, immigration, & Census 2020 with members of congress.



ARAB AMERICAN SERVICE DAY

The Arab American Heritage Council partnered with the Flint Food Bank. This event distributed food to 12,000 people in Flint. National Arab American Service Day was started by NNAAC in 2004 as a way to engage Arab Americans in community service to create stronger communities and make connections among neighbors. Over the past 15 years, it has grown into a nationwide effort in which 19 organizations across the United States participated.

WATER CRISIS TOWN HALL



On May 16, the AAHC held its first ever Flint Water Crisis Town Hall. Led by Flint Water Crisis Liaison, Mai Eltahir, the town hall highlighted important issues reflecting the Water Crisis' impact on immigrant residing in Flint. AAHC in partnership with the Genesee County Hispanic/Latino Collaborative, the Freshwater Future and the International Center of Greater Flint to host the Flint Water Crisis: Invisible Immigrants. This two-hour event raised awareness on the Flint Water Crisis and its impact, specifically, on immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers.

TRUTH, RACIAL HEALING & TRANSFORMATION (TRHT) VISION SESSIONS



This project, led by Community Foundation of Greater Flint was a partnership between the AAHC and the University of Michigan Flint. Residents gathered along with a W.K. Kellogg consultant and participated in a guided community visioning session which included small group discussions. The discussion focused on improving neighborhoods, combatting all forms of racism and discrimination, and rebuilding our educational system.

IMMIGRATION AND LANGUAGE SERVICES

General Immigration Services Offered

The AAHC ran a successful immigration and language program throughout 2018. The AAHC served a total of 56 clients from all different racial and ethnic identities. These clients averaged 3 contacts per client, constituting about 150 instances of contact with the AAHC throughout 2018. The yearly breakdown is as follows:

TRANSLATION: Official document translations included marriage certificates, state identification records, and birth certificates. In-person translation was offered in the office or over the phone for social security announcements, insurance letters and doctor appointment notices.

FILED APPLICATIONS: The applications filed included naturalization (citizenship), adjustment of status, removal of condition for Green Card, and family visa.

CONSULTATIONS: We discussed each client's case with them, and then either assisted them inoffice, the clients pursued the case on their own following AAHC instructions, or the client was referred to trusted immigration providers in our network.

TRAININGS AND MEETINGS: AAHC staff went through 23 trainings regarding immigration, including numerous webinars, in-person intensive trainings, and online workshops covering all aspects of immigration law and new updates to policies.

IMMIGRATION DIRECTOR SPOTLIGHT: Mohammed Alhammadi



Mohammed Alhammadi, an immigrant from Qatif, Saudi Arabia, graduated from Saginaw Valley State University with his Bachelors in Business Management and Administration. While a student, Mohammed was an active member of the Saudi Club at SVSU and a participant in numerous community events focusing on uniting Arabs and non-Arabs alike. Mohammed has a history of managing organizational programming and logistics and is accredited by the Department of Justice to assist immigration clients. Mohammed is fluent in English and Arabic and services all translation clients.




Revenues for Year Ended December 31, 2018
